SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This Ordinance awards the \$2,401,193 in FY 03 Hotel/Motel fund contribution to agencies adopted by the City Council in the General Operating Budget. The ordinance marks the completion of a review process that began in April, 2002, and ended with the Cultural Arts Board's funding recommendations on October 22, 2002.

Upon approval by the City Council, the City Manager, or her designee, will be authorized to contract with the various agencies listed on the attachment, for arts and cultural services.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND

For Fiscal Year 2002-2003, funding applications received by the Office of Cultural Affairs for the Arts Funding Program were processed and reviewed in accordance with the revised funding process approved by City Council on March 28, 2002. In August, a multidisciplinary arts, a performing arts, and a visual arts panel, with staff, reviewed 39 applications and established scores for each organization. After this process was completed, staff developed and presented funding range recommendations to the Cultural Arts Board. In September, applicants presented to the Cultural Arts Board their responses to the panel/staff reviews before the Board established their preliminary funding recommendation. On October 22, 2002, the last phase of the process included the Cultural Arts Board's consideration of any appeals and the finalization of the funding recommendations. The Board's funding recommendations also included a Texas Commission on the Arts grant and

reprogrammed Hotel funds from the last two fiscal years, which are considered in a separate ordinance. The organizations recommended for funding in both ordinances are attached.

POLICY ANALYSIS

The FY 03 Hotel/Motel budget contribution remains at the FY 02 level. However, the awarded funds continue to leverage non-City monies for arts and cultural activities.


FINANCIAL IMPACT
