#### SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This Ordinance will allocate \$50,000 Hotel/Motel funds approved by the City Council in the FY 2003 General Operating Budget to the Contemporary Arts for San Antonio, d.b.a. Blue Star Arts Space for the development of an exhibit entitled "Splendors of Contemporary Mexican Art". The Blue Star Art Space and the Instituto de Mexico, San Antonio office, will organize an exhibit of contemporary art by Mexican artists, including painting, sculpture, photography, video and mixed or other media.

The organizers will utilize the City's contribution to leverage an additional \$50,000 for the exhibition anticipated to open in December, 2003. The organizers propose to raise an additional \$150,000 to permit the exhibit to travel to other cities where the Instituto de Mexico has a cultural center (Los Angeles, New York, Chicago, Washington, D.C., Miami and/or Atlanta) and to publish a full color catalogue

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

#### **BACKGROUND**

In 1990, some of the most influential art and architecture of the Republic of Mexico was exhibited in San Antonio and throughout the United States in the exhibition known as "Splendors of Mexico, Thirty Centuries of Mexican Art". This exhibit raised public and scholarly awareness of the role of Mexican art in the world and more specifically in the Western Hemisphere. Splendors of Mexico also became a blockbuster exhibit for San Antonio, which helped support cultural tourism efforts.

#### **BACKGROUND** (continued)

The proposed exhibit, the "Splendors of Contemporary Mexican Art", will be a timely introduction to the currents of thought and expression that drive the contributions of Mexican art to contemporary culture. The collaborators of this exhibit are currently developing a program that will establish "Splendors of Contemporary Mexican Art", as another blockbuster art event for San Antonio, and to support the visitors industry.

#### **POLICY ANALYSIS**

The exhibit will serve as an attraction for regional, national and international visitors.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPACT**

There is no impact on the General Fund.

#### **COORDINATION**

The award has been coordinated with the Management and Budget Department, the Finance Department, and the City Attorney's Office.

Political Contributions  Any individual or business entity seeking a discretionary contract from the city must disclose in connection with a proposal for a discretionary contract all political contributions totaling one hundred dollars (\$100) or more within the past twenty-four (24) months made directly or indirectly to any member of City Council, or to any political action committee that contributes to City Council elections, by any individual or business entity whose identity must be disclosed under (1), (2) or (3) above. Indirect contributions by an entity include, but are not limited to, contributions made through the officers, owners, or registered lobbyists of the entity.
