DATE: November 21, 2002

SUMMARY & RECOMMENDATION

This proposed ordinance selects the firm of 3D/International, and authorizes the negotiation of a detailed scope of service, fee and contract for the Concourse B & C Design Services Project at San Antonio International Airport. The schematic design for the Concourse B & C Construction Project is nearing completion, and in order to continue the timely implementation and completion of this Project, it is necessary to enlist the services of a design consultant.

The scope of services for this portion of the Concourse B & C Construction Project includes the standard architectural and engineering services associated with building construction together with specialty designs, such as baggage handling, security processing, and flight information displays, which are associated with airport terminal construction.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The City has in the Five-Year Capital Program projects to expand the terminal and parking facilities at San Antonio International Airport in support of the current and projected passenger trend in enplanements, aircraft gate occupancy and parking demands. These projects were included as part of the Terminal Improvement Program presentation to City Council during the June 22, 2000 "B" Session.

The Programming Study for the first phase of the terminal expansion, which will ultimately replace Terminal 2 with Concourse B and Concourse C, was awarded to Marmon Mok/Gensler by City Council on August 9, 2001 and is scheduled to be complete November 2002. This Study also includes the schematic design for the New Concourse B and Concourse C Construction

Project, the terminal roadway system and related infrastructure support. The results of this work will be used by the selected firm to formulate final design documents.

The City requested Interest Statements from firms desiring to provide design services for the Concourse B & C Design Services Project. A pre-proposal meeting was conducted to fully disclose the scope, size and complexity of the Project in order to assist the participants in formulating teams.

A total of five (5) qualified interest statements were received. The following seven City staff members rated all firms, which submitted interest statements to be considered for these services, giving consideration to past experience and recognizing ability and competence to provide such services:

City Managers Office (2)
Economic Development
City Architect's Office
Aviation Department (2)
Economic Development (SBEDA)

Of the five firms, the following four were selected for further evaluation through an interview process:

3D/International
Chesney Morales/Beaty JV
Davis Durand-Holis Rupe Architects
Ford Powell Carson & Rehler Vaughn Koone

This short list was presented to the A/E Selection Committee, which concurred with the recommendation that these four firms be further considered. Interviews were conducted on September 20, 2002 with a committee consisting of:

City Managers Office (2)
City Architect's Office
Aviation Department (2)

Based on the presentations made during the interviews, it is the recommendation of the Interview Committee that the firm of 3D/International be selected for negotiations. A copy of the interview ratings is attached.

The Economic & Human Development Council Committee was briefed on the results of the selection process and of staff's recommendation at the November 7, 2002 meeting during which staff was directed to bring this issue forward to City Council for formal consideration.

POLICY ANALYSIS

This proposed action is consistent with the City's policy of improving facilities at San Antonio International Airport.

FISCAL IMPACT

This proposed action has no fiscal impact. Funds for this work will be appropriated by a subsequent ordinance appropriating the Professional Services Contract. Fees for this contract are estimated to range from \$8,000,000.00 to \$10,000,000.00, and will be established based on the final scope and estimated cost to be determined through the Programming Study scheduled to be complete in November 2002.

COORDINATION

This request for ordinance has been coordinated with Public Works, Finance, City Attorney, and the Office of Management and Budget.


