SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This ordinance provides for final payment to PAR Construction, Inc., in the amount of \$9,236.54, and provides \$1,926.30 payable to Sprinkle Robey Architects for basic services for an overall total of \$11,162.84, in connection with Fire Station No. 8, an authorized 1996 Certificate of Obligation funded project at 619 S. Hamilton located in Council District No. 5.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This ordinance will provide for the closeout of this project that built a new fire station. Final construction payment was delayed pending resolution of close out documents, punch list and warranty items. This ordinance will provide the funds for final payment to the architect and contractor now that those items have been completed.

POLICY ANALYSIS

Approval of this ordinance will be a continuation of Council policy to construct approved funded projects.

FISCAL IMPACT

This is a one-time capital improvement expenditure. Funds in the amount of \$11,162.84 are available from 1996 Certificate of Obligation and authorized payable as follows:


