SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This ordinance amends a 1999 General Obligation (G.O.) Drainage Bond funded professional service contract in the amount of \$14,250.00 to Turner Collie & Braden Inc., a non-MBE firm, for additional engineering services and \$1,425.00 for miscellaneous engineering contingency for an overall total amount of \$15,675.00 in connection with the Ave Maria Drainage Project located in Council District 9.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This ordinance requests additional compensation to Turner Collie & Braden for additional drainage infrastructure and street design at the low water crossing of Jackson-Keller Street. These changes will be incorporated in a revised Phase A Report.

The original scope for this project was limited to a concrete channel design only, which was not a cost-effective option and was undesirable to the neighborhood. This resulted in the re-evaluation and revision of the scope. The revised scope created a savings which allowed the design of a culvert and street to replace the low water crossing at Jackson-Keller, and re-design of underground drainage from Lazywood to the outfall. This project provides for the reconstruction of Ave Maria from Jackson Keller to San Pedro to a typical 30-foot width. A concrete drainage channel is to be constructed from Jackson Keller to Oak Bend. Parkway improvements such as new curbs, sidewalks, driveway approaches, necessary drainage, and utility improvements will also be included. This project is currently under design. The scheduled advertisement date for bids is September 2003, start of construction December 2003, and completion by October 2004.

This professional services contract was originally approved by City Ordinance No. 94912 on March 8, 2002 and initially authorized \$195,470.00 for services related to this project. This Council action will increase the total amount authorized for this professional service contract to \$209,720.00. The current estimated construction cost is \$1,942,000.00, design is \$239,417.00, and Right of Way \$25,000.00 for an estimated total amount of \$2,206,417.00.

POLICY ANALYSIS

Approval of this ordinance will be a continuation of City Council policy to complete previously approved 1999 General Obligation Drainage Improvement Bond funded Capital Improvement Projects.

FISCAL IMPACT

This is a one-time capital improvement expenditure within budget and included in the FY03-08 Capital Improvement Program budget. Funds in the amount of \$15,675.00 are available from 1999 General Obligation Drainage Improvement Bond funds and authorized payable as follows:

\$14,250.00	payable to Turner Collie & Braden, Inc. services	for engineering
\$ 1,425.00	payable for engineering contingency	

The contingency account originally authorized \$19,547.00 for this project. This council action will increase the total amount to \$20,972.00.

COORDINATION



Turner Collie & Braden Inc. is pleased to submit this proposal for additional design services. Design changes will be based City directives and on ultimate flows calculated in the revised TC&B report submitted on September 23, 2002.

The scope of additional services will include the following elements:

- 1. Delete concrete channel design, replace with underground sewer system along the western channel bank between Jackson Keller Road and Oak Run. The City has chosen smooth flow corrugated steel pipe for this section of the project.
- 2. Delete concrete drainage channel design, replace with underground storm sewer from Oak Run to Lazywood (including removal of existing Oak Run bridge culvert structure).
- 3. Redesign of underground drainage system from Lazywood to the outfall to accommodate added design flows.
- 4. Incorporate all changes in a revised Phase A Report and submit for City review.

Our total fee for these additional services is \$14,250.00. The revised project schedule is attached. This proposal does not include the design services fee proposed by letter dated July 39, 2002.
