SUMMARY & RECOMMENDATION

The proposed ordinance authorizes the City Manager or her designee to accept the proposal of International Duty Free Stores Company to operate the duty free concession at San Antonio International Airport. This concession agreement comprises one of the final components of the Concession Redevelopment Program at Airport. International Duty Free Stores Company is being recommended to operate the duty free concession in a 1,046 square foot facility in Terminal 1. In the event that international flights should be offered in Terminal 2 during the contract term, operation will also be permitted from a Terminal 2 kiosk location. The term of the proposed contract will be a five-year period. Concessionaire will pay the greater of 15% of Gross Revenues on sales up to \$500,000 and 20% of Gross Revenues on sales over \$500,000 or a Minimum Annual Guarantee of \$125,000 per year. In the event that a 35% decline in international enplaned passengers as compared to the previous year is experienced for a three-month period, the concessionaire would be relieved of the obligation to pay a Minimum Annual Guarantee and would pay 15% of gross revenue until such time as international enplanements return to their prior level.

Staff recommends the approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

International Duty Free Stores Company is a Texas corporation. It is a subsidiary of UETA, Inc., which itself is a subsidiary of Duty Free Americas, Inc. This company, under various corporate names and ownership, has been operating the duty free stores at San Antonio International Airport for more than thirty years. The concessionaire will offer duty free items to international passengers and duty paid items to domestic passengers. Such items will include fragrances, tobacco products, liquor and wines, cosmetics, edibles, watches and gifts.

In response to the City's request and through its Concession Manager, Westfield Concession Management, proposals for the operation of the duty free concession have been submitted on three occasions. The first submission occurred on December 14, 2001. One proposal was received. Since this submission followed in close proximity to the tragic events of September 11, 2001 which greatly impacted air travel, the financial offering was low and it was determined that resolicitation would be beneficial. The second submission occurred on May 31, 2002. Two proposals were received and contract award was considered by the City Council on November 21, 2002. The Council directed an RFP again be issued so that advertising and marketing program submission would be clearly required, financial information submitted would clearly pertain only to the responding company and other technical clarifications would be made. The third solicitation was made on March 28, 2003. On April 28, 2003, a single response, that International Duty Free Stores Company, was received

POLICY ANALYSIS

The proposed ordinance is consistent with prior policy, as evidenced by the City Council approved Concession Procedures Manual and Policy Statement of January 11, 2001, and will provide needed service to international and domestic passengers at the Airport.

FISCAL IMPACT

The concessionaire will pay during the five-year contract term the greater of a Minimum Annual Guarantee of \$125,000 or 15% of Gross Revenues on sales up to \$500,000 and 20% of Gross Revenues on sales over \$500,000.

COORDINATION

This item has been coordinated with the Asset Management Department and the City Attorney's Office. The proposed agreement was presented to the Economic & Human Development Council Committee on May 14, 2003.
