YOUTH OPPORTUNITY GRANT CONTRACT WITH THE ALAMO

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT, INC.

SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATION

This ordinance acknowledges a Unilateral Modification to the Youth Opportunity grant (YO) contract, which awards funds in an amount of \$4,731,656.00 and extends the term of the contract between the City of San Antonio, Department of Community Initiatives and Alamo Workforce Development, Inc. (AWD) for the YO program for the period beginning July 1, 2003 through June 30, 2004. This ordinance also authorizes acceptance of a budget and approval of the YO personnel complement.

Staff recommends the approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The U.S. Department of Labor awarded AWD the YO grant for the five-year period beginning March 1, 2000. AWD contracts with the Edgewood Independent School District, Alamo Area Community College District, San Antonio Independent School District and the City of San Antonio, Department of Community Initiatives to implement the YO program. The goal of the program is to encourage and assist youth ages 14 to 21 who live in the federally designated Empowerment Zone (EZ) of San Antonio to complete secondary education, enter the workforce or enroll in post secondary education. Program participants also receive health screening, confidential counseling by licensed health professionals, and clinical services in coordination with the Metropolitan Health District.

The YO grant although awarded for a five-year term, is funded on a year-by-year basis with AWD's option to renew the recipient's contract for each of the four subsequent one-year periods. This is the fourth year in the five-year term of the YO grant. Unilateral Modification #2 reflects the exercise of AWD's option to fund the contract for an amount up to \$4,731,656.00 and extend it for the period beginning July 1, 2003 and ending June 30, 2004.

As of April of this year, 884 youth have received comprehensive job readiness training, 165 have participated in internships or subsidized employment, and 704 have obtained long term placements (see table below).

YO has developed and implemented a structured Workforce Development Program (WDP) involving a comprehensive curriculum of education, training and short-term employment leading to long-term unsubsidized employment. In order to deliver the WDP, the YO program created the YO Academy for Training and Advancement, as a delivery mechanism for all aspects of the program. The YO Academy offers multiple paths to accommodate participants' educational and skill training needs. The YO Academy offers classes in adult basic education, GED preparation, real skills training, financial literacy, workplace technology, and a broad range of electives to enrich the participants' community perspective.

The YO Workforce Development Program is being well received by area workforce professionals. YO is focusing on providing industry specific training in the fields of property management, telemarketing and health careers. Current initiatives include advancing our partnerships, collaborations and integration with city departments, social service agencies, educational providers and business organizations.

YO provides the opportunity for many unique career exploration and readiness programs. YO AIM (Advancing Individuals through Mentoring) is the program's premiere internship model offering paid hands-on work experience at various city, county and area social service agency offices. In addition, YO has incorporated the Better Careers training model in conjunction with the Alamo Community College District and in collaboration with the City's Literacy Services Division.

Youth Opportunity members have assisted in the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA)

Program as tax preparers and clerical support staff during the previous two tax years. Members completed an IRS 40-hour training course and passed a certification test covering basic tax forms, electronic filing, and earned income and child tax credits. During the 2001 tax season over 50 YO members assisted in the completion of over 2,000 tax returns, 88% of which were filed electronically. Members also assisted in returning a total of \$1.6 million in Earned Income and Child Tax Credits, and over \$2.7 million in total tax refunds to residents of San Antonio. During the 2002 tax season over 70 YO members were placed at the 12 DCI-operated VITA sites and assisted residents in filing more than 10,000 tax returns throughout the City of San Antonio. A total of \$7 million was returned to the community in Earned Income and Child Tax Credits, and a total of \$14 million was returned in total tax refunds.

In addition to YO's involvement in the national Fatherhood Initiative, YO has been funded to provide financial literacy and family strengthening youth development training to the program participants. The J.P. Morgan Chase Foundation awarded \$20,000 to provide financial literacy to youth in San Antonio. The program teaches financial responsibility, long-term planning, and family budgeting. The Urban Strategies Council provided \$5,000 to create a youth leadership institute to teach participants the values of family self-sufficiency and how to become actively involved in community change. After graduation from the institute, YO participants then present the values of family strengthening to other community organizations and their families.

POLICY ANALYSIS

This ordinance fully supports the City's human development initiative. It specifically targets an area of the City that is characterized by low skill and education completion levels of youth and adults. Recruitment of such individuals, assistance with completing secondary education and placement into higher education or long-term unsubsidized employment directly complements the human development initiative of developing a highly skilled and educated workforce.

Projected Year Four performance measures, still pending approval from AWD, are listed below.

FISCAL IMPACT

This program requires no General Fund support. There are no service fees charged to the program participants.

COORDINATION

The Department of Community Initiatives has coordinated activities with the City Attorney's Office, Finance Department, San Antonio Metropolitan Health District, Office of Management and Budget, and the Alamo Workforce Development Inc.

SUPPLEMENTARY COMMENTS

The provisions of the Ethics Ordinance do not apply.
