SHELTER GRANT (ESG) FUNDS AND TO TRANSFER \$37,000 FROM THE

DWYER TRUST

SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This ordinance approves the reprogramming of \$98,000 from the 2003-04 Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG); authorizing \$35,000 to the San Antonio Food Bank, Inc. to operate the kitchen at the Dwyer Avenue Center and provide culinary training to the homeless; and \$63,000 to the Association for the Advancement of Mexican Americans (AAMA) Inc. for the operation of the Dwyer Avenue Center overflow shelter; and authorizing the transfer of \$37,000 from the Dwyer Trust to AAMA for the operation of the Dwyer Avenue Center overflow shelter.

Staff recommends the approval of this ordinance.

ACKGROUND INFORMATION

ESG is an entitlement grant from the U. S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD). On May 15,2003, Ordinance Number 97634, City Council accepted the FY 2004 award in the amount of \$703,000.

The Dwyer Avenue Center is a City-owned facility that provides housing and supportive services to the homeless. The facility is comprised of 88 Single Room Occupancy units, 16 family units and a 63-bed emergency overflow shelter for women and their children. The San Antonio Metropolitan Ministries (SAMM) currently operates the Dwyer Avenue Center overflow shelter and kitchen.

As part of the City's HUD Consolidated Planning Process, an ESG RFP was issued on February 24, 2003. SAMM did not respond to the Request for Proposals (RFP) and has notified the City

that they will no longer be able to continue this agreement, as they are unable to secure the necessary match funds. Since there were no respondents, the designated funds to operate the shelter were set aside in order to release two RFPs at a later date, one for the operation of the kitchen and one for the operation of the shelter.

The RFP for the operation of the Dwyer kitchen and training program was issued on June 16, 2003. The kitchen at the Dwyer Avenue Center is utilized for meal preparation for the residents of the overflow shelter. This RFP also requested respondents to establish a culinary arts jobtraining program for homeless individuals. One organization responded. The review panel recommended that the City contract with the San Antonio Food Bank, Inc. The award to the San Antonio Food Bank will be for \$35,000. The Food Bank proposes to serve 68,985 meals and train 16 homeless individuals in the culinary arts during the contract period.

On July 7, 2003, an RFP for the day-to-day operation of the Dwyer Avenue Center overflow shelter was released. There was also one respondent, the Association for the Advancement of Mexican Americans (AAMA), Inc. The review panel recommended contracting with AAMA. The ESG reprogramming to AAMA will be \$63,000.

AAMA is based out of Houston, Texas but has programs in San Antonio, Del Rio, Laredo and Edinburg. In San Antonio, AAMA operates the Selena Youth Treatment Center, a residential facility where they provide substance abuse treatment for adolescent females between the ages of 13 and 17 years of age. AAMA also established the George I. Sanchez Charter High School located in downtown San Antonio.

POLICY ANALYSIS

In FY 2004, \$135,000 was designated for the Dwyer Avenue Center overflow shelter and kitchen. From this \$135,000, \$35,000 will be re-allocated to the San Antonio Food Bank, Inc. and \$100,000 to AAMA for the operation of the Dwyer Avenue Center overflow shelter. This ordinance will continue existing City policy to provide needed services to the homeless of San Antonio and Bexar County and supports the recommendations of the Mayor's Task Force on Hunger and Homelessness to sustain a safety net for homeless families. It will allow the City to shelter 21 families who are in crisis. In addition, it provides for training and employment opportunities for the homeless designed to help them achieve self-sufficiency.

FISCAL IMPACT

This ordinance authorizes the reprogramming of \$35,000 in ESG funds to the San Antonio Food Bank, Inc and \$63,000 to AAMC. Federal regulations require ESG funds to be matched at 100%.

This ordinance also authorizes a transfer of \$37,000 from the Dwyer Trust to **AAMA**.
