SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

An Ordinance authorizing the execution of a Lease Agreement with Free Trade Alliance San Antonio, a Texas Non-Profit Corporation, for the use of 2,521 square feet of office space at the International Center, located at 203 St. Mary's Street, at an annual rental of \$33,277.20 (\$2,773.10 per month) plus Common Areas Costs (C.A.M. charges") of \$6,957.96 annually (\$579.83 monthly), subject to annual adjustment, for a three year term commencing January 16, 2004, with one (1) three-year renewal option, subject to City Council Approval.

Staff recommends approval.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In 1996, construction began on the redevelopment of the former site of the Main Library into a mixed use building named the International Center, to house City of San Antonio departments and public and private enterprises focused on international relations and trade. Construction of the International Center was substantially completed in December 1997.

Free Trade Alliance San Antonio is a public/private partnership between the City of San Antonio, the Greater San Antonio Chamber of Commerce, the San Antonio Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, the Economic Development Foundation, and approximately 200 private San Antonio businesses dedicated to making San Antonio a center for international trade in the Americas. Free Trade Alliance San Antonio works closely with the City's International Affairs and Economic Development Departments to achieve their goals.

Free Trade Alliance San Antonio has been a tenant at the International Center since January 15, 1998 as approved by Ordinance 87410, dated February 26, 1998, which authorized a three-year lease term and one, three-year renewal option that was exercised and approved by Ordinance 93167, dated January 4, 2001, which extended the lease term

through January 15, 2004. This proposed action provides for a new Lease Agreement with a three-year term commencing January 16, 2004. In addition, this lease provides for one three-year renewal option, subject to City Council approval. Since 1998, Free Trade Alliance has paid a rental rate of \$13.20 per square foot per year. The Lease did, however, provide for a rental rate of \$6.60 on 270 square feet occupied by the Tenant. This proposed Lease Agreement maintains the rental rate of \$13.20 per square foot but applies it to all space occupied by Free Trade Alliance.

POLICY ANALYSIS

Approval of this agreement is consistent with the policy to generate revenue through the leasing of City-owned properties.

FISCAL IMPACT

Under the terms of the Lease Agreement, Free Trade Alliance San Antonio will pay rent at the rate of \$13.20 per square foot per year, for a total annual rent of \$33,277.20 (\$2,773.10 monthly). This reflects an annual rental increase of \$1,782 over the previous rental structure. In addition, Free Trade Alliance San Antonio will reimburse the City for their proportionate share of the Common Areas costs (C.A.M. charges) in the amount of \$2.76 per square foot per year, for a total of \$6,957.96 annually (\$579.83 monthly), subject to annual adjustments, but will be limited to an increase of not more than fifteen (15%) percent per year.
