SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This ordinance authorizes the execution of nine delegate agency contracts to provide food and support services to the hungry and homeless. Contracts to agencies for the enhancement of food pantries include: San Antonio Food Bank (SAFB) for \$134,671; Catholic Charities, Archdiocese of San Antonio, Inc. for \$20,000; Christian Assistance Ministry (CAM) for \$24,000; Hispanic Religious Partnership for Community Health Inc. (HRPCH) for \$28,212; and Corazon Ministries, Inc. for \$21,329. In order to better serve intact homeless families with children, a contract will be awarded to San Antonio Metropolitan Ministry, Inc. (SAMM) for \$93,925 for emergency shelter beds. Contracts for day drop-in centers will be awarded to Corazon Ministries, Inc. for \$54,184 and to CAM for \$25,100. Ministries. Inc. will also be awarded \$107.339 for the provision of services related to a mobile canteen. All selected agencies will also provide outreach to expand the food stamp program. These contracts will be executed for the period beginning January 1, 2004 and ending December 31, 2004.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In the summer of 2003, Mayor Ed Garza established the Mayor's Task Force on Hunger & Homelessness to address problems associated with these issues. The Committee Chairs for the Task Force are Councilmembers Patti Radle and Julian Castro. Local respondents to the 2002 U.S. Conference of Mayor's Report on Hunger and Homelessness indicated they have experienced a 20 percent increase in requests for food. Local homeless shelters also indicated they were turning away homeless families with children due to a limited capacity to serve this population.

The 16-member Task Force is comprised of individuals with various backgrounds, including representatives of local non-profits, faith-based organizations, academia, and community representatives who may have experienced either hunger or homelessness. One of the recommendations made by the Task Force was to increase funding for food pantries that serve the hungry and to increase food stamp access through funding and outreach efforts. Additionally, in the area of homelessness, the Task Force recommended increasing the number of emergency beds to house intact families, funding a mobile canteen to feed the chronic homeless population and providing day center services for the chronically homeless.

Ordinance #98181, passed and approved on September 18, 2003, authorized \$1,014,000 in one-time funding to augment hunger prevention and supportive services for the homeless. City Council awarded \$270,000 to the SAFB for the expansion of Project Healthy Options Program for the Elderly (HOPE) on that same date. Project HOPE provides 25 pounds of non-perishable food items twice a month to seniors at DCI's Senior Nutrition Sites.

The Task Force recommended to City Council four funding priorities that were specified in a Request for Proposals (RFP) issued on October 22, 2003. An amount of \$660,000 was designated for this RFP. A total of nine responses were received.

Category 1: Food Pantries

The focus of this effort is to increase the quantity and quality of food provided in a cost-efficient manner by funding food pantries and congregate meal sites that serve low-income families. In addition, this effort will strengthen the community's ability to promote maximum participation in the food stamp program.

Category 2: Mobile Canteen

City Council allocated up to \$200,000 for mobile canteen expansion. The RFP required the contractor to provide up to 300 meals per day and to serve meals at a minimum of two locations Mondays through Fridays. These meals will be served in the evening, after the local shelters have stopped serving food. The goal of this project is to feed the chronic homeless who do not access shelters or meals served at the shelters. The homeless will be informed of available services, including health screenings, and will be provided assistance in applying for food stamps. In addition, volunteers will provide clothing and personal hygiene items. A nurse and physician will be available through Corazon Ministries to provide services and referrals, as needed.

Category 3: Emergency Shelter Room

City Council allocated up to \$200,000 to support the creation of additional emergency shelter beds for families with children. This priority was selected because two of the larger emergency shelters (SAMM and Salvation Army) have been reporting that they turn away families with children. The Mayor's Task Force on Hunger & Homelessness has recommended twelve rooms for families with children be added to the City's inventory.

Another RFP will be issued for additional emergency shelter beds to serve intact families, because SAMM is only able to provide seven of the twelve additional beds recommended by the Task Force. The second RFP will also seek proposals for additional food stamp outreach efforts.

Category 4: Day Center Services

City Council allocated up to \$60,000 to provide day center services to the chronically homeless population. The proposed day centers will provide a facility for the homeless to seek protection from the elements, take showers, receive mail, secure identification documents, and seek out support and legal services.

POLICY ANALYSIS

This ordinance continues existing City policy of providing services to the hungry and homeless population of San Antonio and Bexar County and supports the recommendations of the Mayor's Task Force on Hunger and Homelessness to sustain a safety net for individuals and families.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is a General Fund commitment of \$592,670 associated with these contracts. This is a one-time budgeted item approved by City Council on September 18, 2003. Applicants were strongly encouraged to demonstrate how these investments would leverage other resources. The Task Force will return to Council in January 2004 with recommendations for a strategic plan to eliminate chronic homelessness and hunger over the next ten years.

COORDINATION

Coordination has occurred with the City Attorney's Office, Asset Management, Finance Department, and the Mayor's Task Force on Hunger & Homelessness.
