#### **SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS**

This proposed ordinance authorizes an amendment to the Professional Services Contract with Gould Evans, P.L.L.C. in an amount not to exceed \$15,990.00 to provide additional design services in connection with the Roadway and Entrance Landscaping Project at San Antonio International Airport. These services are for new architecturally enhanced light poles and fixtures for Airport Boulevard and South Terminal Drive, which were recommended as part of the schematic design review process and thus not included in the original scope of work. This amount also includes construction document development of the water feature also developed and presented during the schematic design phase.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Ordinance No. 97503, passed and approved on April 24, 2003, authorized a contract with Gould Evans, P.L.L.C. in the amount of \$97,010.00 to provide architectural services in connection with the Roadway and Entrance Landscaping Project at San Antonio International Airport. Gould Evans, P.L.L.C. has prepared schematic design drawings and concept plans for the new Roadway and Entrance Landscaping Project at San Antonio International Airport, which have been reviewed City staff, the Management Team and the Historical Design and Review Commission. Based on this review process, recommendations have been made to include street light upgrades, as part of the landscaping. These upgrades are for the replacement of old light poles and fixtures along Airport Boulevard and South Terminal Drive. Also not included as part of the original scope of work were fees for construction document development of a water feature, which was the architectural enhancement element developed during the schematic design process.

Gould Evans, P.L.L.C. has submitted a proposal in an amount not to exceed \$15,990.00. This amount includes \$11,990.00 for architectural services in connection with the revised scope of services for the streetlight upgrades and \$4,000.00 for development of the water feature construction documents contained in the schematic design. Total architectural fees under this contract, including this additional fee of \$15,990.00, will be \$113,000.00. Members of City staff and the Program Manager have reviewed the scope of services and the fees outlined in the proposal and have determined that the fees presented are fair and reasonable.

#### **POLICY ANALYSIS**

This proposed action continues the policy of improving facilities at San Antonio International Airport.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**

This Project is funded by the Airport Improvement and Contingency Fund. This ordinance appropriates \$15,990.00 for architectural fees. Future appropriations for construction, estimated to be \$650,000.00, will be brought forward for City Council consideration in future ordinances.

#### **COORDINATION**

This request for ordinance has been coordinated with the Public Works, Finance and Office of Management & Budget Departments.



I am providing you with a revised proposal for additional services fees for engineering services to upgrade the existing roadway lighting and utilizing an artist to assist with the design of a water for the San Antonio International Airport Roadway and Entrance Landscaping Project.

#### Scope of Services

The scope of services for lighting design services will be modified as follows:

- Existing lighting and lighting controls will be investigated and analyzed to determine if meters, power centers, conduit and wiring can be utilized in the upgrade of the new roadway lighting.
- Existing light pole footings will be investigated and analyzed for possible reuse with new lighting design.
- Gould Evans Associates will contact 3DI to coordinate the proposed lighting upgrade project with the overall landscape lighting concept for the airport. This process will continue through the completion of lighting design.
- Poles and fixtures will be selected for submittal to airport staff for review and approval.
- Lighting plans and details will be prepared.
- J.C. Engineering, detailed in our original proposal, will supply the site investigation and electrical engineering services.

The scope of services for artist design services will be modified as follows:

- Artist would assist in the design through construction document phase of the water feature south of the central plaza.
- Artist will provide specific elements of the design that would be fabricated under the construction budget cost.
- Gould Evans Associates will coordinate the work of the artist. This process will continue through the completion of water feature design.
- Margo Sawyer will supply the artist design services.
