SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This ordinance amends a professional service contract in the amount of \$9,430.00 payable to artist Twyla Arthur, for additional design services in connection with the Fulton Street - Blanco to N. Flores Project, an authorized Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funded project located in Council District 1.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This ordinance will amend the professional services agreement for this project and provide additional compensation to artist Twyla Arthur for the fabrication and installation of design enhancements integrated into the Fulton Avenue Street Reconstruction Project. The original design and estimate provided for a 250 foot retaining wall; however, the wall length was increased to 350 feet in length to aesthetically coordinate the retaining wall design with the ADA accessible sidewalk and turn-around, and as a result, an additional 410 square feet of enhancements were required to complete the increased surface area. The original estimate for the retaining wall enhancements was calculated based on the rate of \$23.26/sq. ft., the cost of \$9,430.00 for the additional work authorized by this ordinance was calculated at \$23.00/sq. ft.

The retaining wall enhancement features slate stone with mosaic areas that incorporate small items collected through neighborhood collaboration, such as rocks, glass, fossils and ceramic tile pieces. The top of the wall has been done in quartzite, and the top edge of the wall is outlined with black Mexican beach pebbles. In addition, there are two, four-sided columns, approximately nine feet tall by ten feet in diameter. These are also clad with the Mexican Beach Pebbles.

A mural has also been painted on both sides of Fulton Street railroad underpass. The design includes flowering vines that become more lush and abundant as they come out onto the wing walls of the underpass into daylight.

The terms and conditions of the contract with the artist Twyla Arthur were approved by City Council on May 20, 1999 through Ordinance Number 89781 for the creation and visual rendering of design enhancements and initially authorized \$3,750.00 for services related to this project. Ordinance number

97830 on June 26, 2003 authorized an amendment to the contract in the amount of \$31,000.00 to provide for the installation and fabrication of the design enhancement features. This ordinance will increase the total authorized for this project to \$44,180.00.

POLICY ANALYSIS

Approval of this ordinance will be a continuation of City Council policy to complete previously approved Community Development Block Grant funded projects.

FISCAL IMPACT

This is a one-time capital improvement expenditure within budget and not included in the FY 04-09 Capital Improvement Program Budget. Funds in the amount of \$9,430.00 are available from CDBG funds and are authorized payable to Twyla Arthur.

COORDINATION

This request for ordinance has been coordinated with the Office of Management and Budget, Housing and Community Development and the Finance Department.



Request for review of payment compensation in view of increased scope of work on retaining wall since completion of the design phase.

My last communications from Alamo Engineering show the wall at a maximum height of 36" and a length of 250' (105' on one side of the railroad underpass and 145' on the other side).

Today, the wall measures 350' in length. That is an added 100 linear feet.

Total add. wall surface.......410 sq. ft.

(average cost since mosaic details and rock borders are more expensive than background wall surfaces).

Indirect contributions by an entity include, but are not limited to, contributions made through the officers, owners, attorneys, or registered lobbyists of the entity.
