SUMMARY & RECOMMENDATION

The proposed ordinance authorizes the City Manager or her designee to accept assignment of an existing Concession Agreement with Famiglia International, Inc., known as Famous Famiglia, to FD Leasing Group, L.L.C. The assignment, transferring all rights and interest, would allow the continuation of a popular Italian food concession located in Terminal One at San Antonio International Airport.

Staff recommends the approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In response to the City's request and through its Concession Manager, Westfield Concession Management, Famiglia International, Inc. submitted a proposal on December 14, 2001 and was awarded a concession contract by City Council pursuant to Ordinance Number 95351, adopted on February 22, 2002, for Terminal One concession space 124, San Antonio International Airport. Famiglia International, Inc., known as Famous Famiglia, has operated since that date and has provided quality customer service and products to the traveling public. The Concessionaire has proven to be an outstanding contributor to the San Antonio International Airport concession program, generating average sales of \$94,326 per month in 2002 and \$96,385 per month in 2003. The Concession has produced \$133,454 in concession revenue to the City during the 2003 time period.

To facilitate future expansion and continued stability of the existing Famous Famiglia airport locations in San Antonio; Newark, New Jersey; George W. Bush Intercontinental, Houston, Texas; JFK, New York City, NY in addition to numerous shopping mall locations nationwide, Famiglia International, Inc. has entered into a partnership with the DeBartolo Group. The FD Leasing Group L.L.C. is a partnership formed by the original Concessionaire, Famiglia International, Inc. and the DeBartolo Group. The formation of the partnership and investment by

DeBartolo will greatly improve the financial strength of the Concessionaire. In addition, the formation of the partnership will allow for the investment of approximately \$7,000,000 by the DeBartolo Group into Famiglia International. The resulting partnership will provide for an improved financial condition and performance in all financial obligations.

POLICY ANALYSIS

The proposed ordinance is consistent with prior City policy and City Council's approved Concession Procedures Manual and Policy Statement of January 11, 2001.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no financial impact to the City.

COORDINATION

This item has been coordinated with the Asset Management Department and the City Attorney's Office.
