#### SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This ordinance amends a professional service contract in the amount of \$15,633 payable to Hoyt Consulting Engineers, Inc. for professional engineering services, in connection with the El Monte – Blanco to San Pedro, Phase II project, an authorized 2003-2007 General Obligation Street Improvement Bond funded project located in Council District 1.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

This professional service contract was originally approved by City Ordinance No. 81848 on March 16, 1995 and initially authorized \$50,000 for services related to the Flores/Breeden/Beacon Outfall Project. Ordinance Number 83949, passed and approved on April 18, 1996 authorized additional funds in the amount of \$103,415.00 for professional services associated with the final design and oversight of that project. Ordinance Number 88950, passed and approved on December 17, 1998 authorized additional funds in the amount of \$65,500 for professional services in conjunction with the award of the construction contract for the Flores/Breeden/Beacon, Phase I project. On March 16, 2000, Ordinance Number 91422 authorized the extension of the scope of the Flores/Breeden/Beacon Project to include the El Monte - Flores to San Pedro project, to save time, advertising costs and to reduce construction costs, and authorized funds in the amount of \$161,200 payable to Hoyt Consulting Engineers for the completion of final plans for the Flores/Breeden/Beacon, Phase II Project. On November 15, 2001, Ordinance Number 94916 authorized funds in the amount of \$7,610 for additional professional services for the preparation of Traffic Control Plans in connection with the N. Flores/Breeden/Beacon Drainage Outfall, Phase II project.

Subsequently, the El Monte – Flores to San Pedro project was divided into three phases. The second, the El Monte – Blanco to San Pedro, Phase II project referenced herein provides for the reconstruction of N. Flores from El Monte to La Manda to a roadway width of 30-feet (2 lanes), including curbs, ADA accessible, 4-foot sidewalks, as well as driveway approaches and drainage improvements. On August 22, 2002, Ordinance Number 96219 authorized funds in the amount of \$24,900 for additional professional engineering services required due to changes in the scope of the project in conjunction with the contract award for the construction of the Flores/Breeden/Beacon Drainage Outfall, Phase II and the El Monte from Flores to San Pedro projects. Ordinance Number 96835, passed and approved on December 12, 2002 authorized funds in the amount of \$69,900 payable to Hoyt Consulting Engineers, Inc. for additional professional services to include the development of plans for the El Monte – Blanco to San Pedro, Phase I through the final design phase and the El Monte – Blanco to San Pedro, Phase III plans through Phase B, the detailed design phase.

This ordinance will authorize funds in the amount of \$15,633 payable to Hoyt Consulting Engineers, Inc. for additional services in connection with the El Monte – Blanco to San Pedro, Phase II project, to include fees for the bid and construction phase of the project, Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR) inspection and review and other miscellaneous additional services as shown in more detail in the consultant's proposal included herein as Attachment 2. This ordinance will increase the total authorized for this professional service contract to \$498,158. The El Monte – Blanco to San Pedro, Phase II project construction is anticipated to begin in August of 2004 and be completed in February of 2005.

#### **POLICY ANALYSIS**

Approval of this ordinance will be a continuation of City Council policy to complete previously approved 2003-2007 General Obligation Street Improvement Bond projects.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

This project was approved as a result of the November 4, 2003 bond election. Although this project was not included in the FY04-09 Capital Improvement Program Budget, approval of this ordinance will appropriately modify the capital budget. Funds in the amount of \$15,633 are available from the 2003-2007 General Obligation Street Improvement Bonds, and are authorized payable to Hoyt Consulting Engineers, Inc.

#### **COORDINATION**

This request for ordinance has been coordinated with the Office of Management and Budget and the Finance Department.





Dear Jim.

We are pleased to offer this revised proposal to complete Civil Engineering Services on this project.

Since the fee through Design Phase (\$24,900) is of record, we propose to use it (with inflation) as the basis for this proposal. Fee through design with 4% inflation compounded for 3.25 years = \$28,600.

Percent by Phase:

Phase A 30% Phase B 25% Design Phase 20% Bid Phase 10% Construction Phase 15%

Fee Basis = Fee through Design \$28,600 = 38,133.33 % through Design 0.75

In reviewing this proposal please bear-in-mind that when engineering services are not continuous it is less efficient which increases our costs. Also, during the time delays, City criteria has changed which causes redesign, redrafting and replotting. Further, the City of San Antonio has built new sidewalks within the project area and some property owners have changed driveways, fences, etc. This causes a need to resurvey and redraft drawings to update existing conditions.

Our 95% plans will have to be updated and replotted for changes in standards including wheel chair ramp location revisions. Further, since El Monte Phase II is being built before El Monte Phase I, the grades will have to be revised to take all flow to La Manda and then drainage will have to be restaked.

The above narrative provides the basis for the following fee breakdown.
