SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

An Ordinance approving the execution of a Food and Beverage Concession Contract for the Municipal Auditorium between the City of San Antonio and Facility Concession Services dba Spectrum effective May 1, 2004 on a month-to-month basis not to exceed ten (10) months (through February 2005) and provides for payment to the City of 32.5% of Concessionaire's receipts, after sales taxes. The projected commission of \$22,370 represents ten (10) months or \$2,237 monthly.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Spectrum has provided good food and beverage concession services at the Municipal Auditorium since April 1997. The most current contract, which became effective on April 15, 2002, expired on April 30, 2004. On July 29, 2004, staff had recommended City Council approve a ratification of a one year extension as provided for in that contract. However, upon consideration, City Council directed staff to provide for the needed services through a new month-to-month contract rather than an extension of the expired contract so that Convention Facilities staff will have sufficient time to evaluate options available to the City concerning concessions contracts at the Convention Center and Municipal Auditorium. Approval of this Ordinance will comply with the directive of the City Council, provide an effective date of May 1, 2004 for the month-to-month contract covering the time period which has elapsed since the expiration of the prior contract, and authorize food and beverage concession services to continue to be provided for up to six additional months.

POLICY ANALYSIS

The Economic Development Department has reviewed and approved the updated Good Faith Effort Plan that was submitted by Spectrum. Spectrum has assured the City that they will make every reasonable business effort to follow the City's SBEDA policies of utilizing local, small, minority and/or women-owned businesses as potential suppliers to assist in the performance of their contract.

FISCAL IMPACT

The City receives a 32.5% commission of Gross Receipts after sales taxes are paid. The contract is expected to generate \$22,370 for ten (10) months or \$2,237 monthly.

COORDINATION

This item has been coordinated with the City Attorney's Office, the Contract Services Division of Asset Management, and Economic Development.
