DATE: October 7, 2004

SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This Ordinance awards the \$2,329,157 in FY 05 Community and Visitor Facilities funds adopted by the City Council in the General Operating Budget to support the operations and projects of various local arts agencies. The ordinance marks the completion of a review process that began in January 2004, and ended with the Cultural Arts Board's final funding recommendations on September 7, 2004.

Upon approval by the City Council, the Interim City Manager, or his designee, will be authorized to contract with the agencies listed on the attachment for arts and cultural services.

The Cultural Arts Board and Staff recommend approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND

For fiscal year 2004-2005, funding applications received by the Office of Cultural Affairs for the Arts Funding Program were processed and reviewed in accordance with the revised funding process approved by City Council on March 28, 2002. In April, a multidisciplinary, performing, and visual arts panel/staff reviewed 41 applications and established scores for each organization based on review criteria that included artistic merit, audience development, and administrative capacity. Staff subsequently developed funding recommendations based on panel/staff review and presented this information to the Cultural Arts Board (CAB). In May, applicants presented to CAB their responses to the panel/staff reviews before the Board established their preliminary funding recommendation using established criteria that included Panel Results & Agency Presentations, Applicant's Stability & Growth, Cost of Services and Provision of Diverse Services.

As part of the last phase of the process, conducted on September 7, 2004, the CAB considered nine appeals and the finalization of the funding recommendations. CAB voted to reject seven appeals, but accepted the appeals of two agencies that later received adjustments increasing their funding recommendations. The CAB also recommended the earmarking of \$10,000 to implement a

mandatory workshop on board, programming and marketing diversity for agency directors and a member of their boards to attend.

The CAB's proposed final funding recommendations also included a Texas Commission on the Arts grant totally \$37,480, which is being considered by separate ordinance. The organizations recommended for funding in both ordinances are attached.

POLICY ANALYSIS

The FY 05 Community and Visitor Facilities Fund budget contribution remains at the FY 04 level of \$2,329,157. The awarded funds continue to leverage non-City monies for arts and cultural activities.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The total funding derived from the Community and Visitor Facilities Fund is \$2,329,157, which includes \$2,148,924 to arts agencies, \$100,000 for the Arts in the Community Program, \$66,108 for marketing and \$14,125 for technical assistance. There is no impact on the General Fund.

COORDINATION


The acceptance of the grant has been coordinated with the Office of Management and Budget, the Finance Department, the City Attorney's Office, and the Cultural Arts Board.
