SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This ordinance authorizes funds in the amount of \$2,400.00 payable to James W. Ponton, MAI, for appraisal services in connection with the Marbach Road Phase I – Military Drive to Pinn Road project, an authorized 2003-2007 General Obligation Street Improvement Bond project, located in Council District 6.

Staff recommends the approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The scope of this project provides for the total reconstruction of Marbach Road from Pinn Road to 200 feet west of Military Drive and will include curbs, sidewalks, and necessary drainage. Advertisement is scheduled for April 2006 with construction anticipated to start in July 2006 and completion projected for December 2007.

POLICY ANALYSIS

Approval of this ordinance will be a continuation of City Council policy to complete 2003-2007 General Obligation Street Improvement Bond funded Capital Improvement Projects.

FISCAL IMPACT

This is a one-time capital improvement expenditure within budget and is included in the FY05-FY10 Capital Improvement Program Budget. Funds in the amount of \$2,400 are available from 2003-2007 General Obligation Street Improvement Bonds, and authorized to be appropriated and payable to James W. Ponton, MAI.

COORDINATION

This ordinance was coordinated with the Finance Department, the Office of Management and Budget, and the City Attorney's Office.

Disclosure of Parties, Owners, and Closely Related Persons

For the purpose of assisting the City in the enforcement of provisions contained in the City Charter and the Code of Ethics, an individual or business entity seeking a discretionary contract from the City is required to disclose in connection with a proposal for a discretionary contract:

(1) the identity of any individual who would be a party to the discretionary contract:

(3) the identity of any <i>lobbyist</i> or <i>public relations firm</i> employed for purposes relating to the			
discretionary contract being sought by any individual or business entity who would be a party to			
the discretionary contract.			
Political Contributions Any individual or business entity seeking a discretionary contract from the city must disclose in			
connection with a proposal for a discretionary contract all political contributions totaling one			
hundred dollars (\$100) or more within the past twenty-four (24) months made directly or			
indirectly to any <i>current</i> or <i>former member</i> of City Council, any <i>candidate</i> for City Council, or to			
any political action committee that contributes to City Council elections, by any individual or			
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business entity whose identity must be disclosed under (1), (2) or (3) above. Indirect			
contributions by an individual include, but are not limited to, contributions made by the			
individual's spouse, whether statutory or common-law. Indirect contributions by an individual or			
an entity include, but are not limited to, contributions made by the officers, owners, attorneys, or			
registered lobbyists of the indiv	idual or the entity.
