SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This ordinance accepts a proposal and authorizes a professional services agreement in the amount of \$137,755 for professional engineering services payable to Turner Collie & Braden, authorizes \$13,775 for Project Contingency, and \$10,607.10 for Capital Administrative Costs, for a total ordinance amount of \$162,137.10, in connection with the Upper Leon Creek Regional Storm Water Facility project, an authorized 2005 Storm Water Revenue Bond project located in Council District 8.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This project provides for the design and construction of a regional detention facility in the Upper Leon Creek watershed near Leon Springs. The project will reduce flooding in the Upper Leon Creek Watershed during 25 to 100-year storm events for both existing and ultimate development conditions. Advertisement is scheduled for December 2006, with construction anticipated to begin in March 2007.

This ordinance authorizes compensation in the amount of \$102,775 payable to Turner Collie & Braden for professional engineering services necessary to complete a Preliminary Phase A Design of Upper Leon Creek in order to identify the appropriate project location, size and configurations and to provide recommendations for the project scope. Additional services will be provided for an amount not to exceed \$34,980 and will include surveying services. These services are outlined in the Professional Services Agreement, included herein as Attachment 4. Upon completion of the Preliminary Phase A Design, the City will negotiate with Turner Collie & Braden for the design of the selected project option and will amend the professional services agreement for said services.

This firm was selected following the City's release of a Request for Qualifications to which twenty-two (22) firms responded. The Public Works Architectural and Engineering (A/E) Selection Committee met and discussed the statements of qualifications, as well as their evaluations for each of the submitting firms. After careful consideration, the Committee selected Turner Collie & Braden, which was the number three ranked firm and has a 50% Historically Underutilized Enterprise (HUE) designation. The number one ranked firm, PBS&J was selected for the Laddie Place Regional Storm Water Detention Facility, Phase II project, which has been estimated at \$5.1 million, and the number two ranked firm, Pape-Dawson Engineers, Inc., was selected for the Broadway Corridor, Phase I project that has been estimated at \$7.3 million. The Statement of Interest Review Summary is included

herein as Attachment 2. Turner Collie & Braden currently has one (1) active project with the City for total fees of \$214,870.

POLICY ANALYSIS

Approval of this ordinance will be a continuation of City Council policy to complete previously approved 2005 Storm Water Revenue Bond Projects.

FISCAL IMPACT

This is a one-time capital improvement expenditure within budget and included in the FY 05-10 Capital Improvement Program Budget. Funds in the amount of \$162,137.10 are available from 2005 Storm Water Revenue Bond funds and are authorized payable as follows:

\$137,755.00	to Turner Collie & Braden for professional services
\$ 13,775.00	for Project Contingency
\$ 10,607.10	for Capital Administrative Costs


