SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This ordinance accepts the proposal and amends a professional service agreement with Fisher Heck, Inc. Architects, a SBE firm, for additional architectural services, in the amount of \$100,939, authorizes \$127,594 for Project Contingency, and authorizes \$15,993.88 for Capital Administrative Costs, for a total ordinance amount of \$244,526.88 in connection with the Animal Care Facility, a 2003-2007 General Obligation Public Health and Safety Improvement Bond funded project, located in the Southwest Business and Technology Park near Old Highway 90 and Texas Highway 151 in Council District 6.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This project will provide for an approximately 42,000 square-foot facility, which will be located on approximately eight (8) acres. The Animal Care Facility will include kennels, a veterinary clinic, employee locker rooms, administrative space, as well as parking for animal control vehicles, visitors and employees. This facility will be 43 percent larger in size than the current facility, and will allow for a three (3) day holding period for animals being housed at the facility. Construction is anticipated to begin in February 2006 and to be completed in July of 2007.

This ordinance provides additional compensation in the amount of \$100,939, payable to Fisher Heck, Inc. Architects, for professional architectural services necessary for the preparation of construction documents and design administration for additional adoption and stray kennels, which will further increase the holding capacity at the facility. The additional services will also include facility design enhancement features utilizing a local artist. The \$127,594 project contingency amount includes the standard 10% or \$10,094, plus \$117,500 for new utility impact fees associated with providing new utility services to the project site.

The initial architectural services for this project in the amount of \$194,359, which included a site master plan, programming, and preliminary design, were approved by City Council on June 10, 2004 through Ordinance No. 99332 and have been completed. The full scope of design services in the amount of \$555,776 were approved by City Council on May 20, 2005 through Ordinance No. 100925 and shall be completed by November of 2005. This ordinance will increase the total professional services contract to \$851,074.

POLICY ANALYSIS

Approval of this ordinance will be a continuation of City Council policy to implement previously approved 2003-2007 General Obligation Public Health and Safety Improvement Bond funded Capital Improvement Projects.

FISCAL IMPACT

This is a one-time capital improvement expenditure within budget, and included in the FY 06-11 Capital Improvement Program Budget. Funds in the amount of \$244,526.88 are available from 2003-2007 General Obligation Public Health and Safety Improvement Bond funds and authorized payable and appropriated as follows:

\$ 100,939.00	payable to Fisher Heck, Inc. Architects for additional architectural services
\$ 127,594.00	for Project Contingency
\$ 15,993.88	for Capital Administrative Costs

This item represents a portion of a total estimated project cost of \$12,100,000.

COORDINATION

This request for ordinance has been coordinated with the Finance Department, the Office of Management and Budget, and the San Antonio Metropolitan Health District.


