**SUBJECT:** Approving the Cultural Arts Board and Staff's FY 06 recommendations, authorizing the appropriation of \$2,329,157 in Community and Visitors Facilities funds approved in the FY 06 General Operating Budget to support Art Agencies

**DATE:** November 3, 2005

**SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS**

This Ordinance awards \$2,329,157 of FY 2006 Community and Visitors Facilities (CVF) funds adopted by the City Council in the FY 2006 General Operating Budget to support the operations of 26 local arts agencies and to provide other services. The ordinance supports the recommendations adopted by City Council on October 7, 2004, which outlined a two-year funding cycle, and the Cultural Arts Board's initial funding recommendations on August 30, 2005, which supports the previous action. City Council's action does not include the additional increase to arts funding provided in the adopted FY 05-06 budget.

Upon approval by the City Council, the City Manager, or his designee, will be authorized to contract with the agencies listed on the attachment, for arts and cultural services.

The Cultural Arts Board and Staff recommend approval of this ordinance.

**BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The Office of Cultural Affairs current Funding Arts Program provides two primary types of financial support to arts and cultural agencies. The first type of support is operational support and second is project support. Agencies that apply and receive operational support are, by policy, put on a two year funding cycle. Agencies that apply for project support, however, receive funding for one year only. In short, the city awards operational support every two years and project support annually. In addition to these two types of support, the Program also supports the Art in the Community Program, Marketing of the Fall Arts Festivals, and technical support to agencies. The funds that support these activities are from the Community & Visitors Facilities Fund and from the Texas Commission on the Arts (TCA).

## **BACKGROUND CONTINUED:**

In October 7, 2004 (FY 2005), City Council approved CAB and Staff funding recommendations that included 26 agencies receiving operating support and 7 agencies receiving project support.

Council also approved funding to provide other services. The total dollars awarded in FY 2005 are as follows:

Early this year, the Cultural Arts Board approved making project applications available with a budget of \$22,205 of CVF funds. Additionally, OCA will receive later this year a Texas Commission on the Arts \$34,127 grant, increasing the dollars available for projects. The project review process started in March and ended on October 18, with the Cultural Arts Board final project funding recommendations. Staff will present the recommendations to City Council after the TCA grant is in place.

On August 30, CAB approved the proposed FY 2006 CVF funds to support the operations of the 26 arts agencies currently on the two-year cycle as well as funding the additional annual services. CAB did not anticipate nor included the increase of \$819,000 to arts funding approved by City Council on September 15 when these recommendations were developed. CAB's FY 2006 funding recommendations, therefore, reflect the same funding levels awarded in FY 2005. Use of the additional increase to arts funding will be determined later.

The organizations and other services recommended for funding in this ordinance is attached.

## **POLICY ANALYSIS**

The FY 2006 Community and Visitors Facilities budget contribution for the remaining year of FY 2005 level. However, the awarded funds continue to leverage non-City monies for arts and cultural activities.

## **FINANCIAL IMPACT**

The total funding derived from the Community and Visitors Facilities Fund is \$2,329,157, which includes \$2,126,719 to arts agencies, \$100,000 for the Arts in the Community Program, \$80,233 for marketing and \$22,205 for projects. There is no impact on the General Fund.

## **COORDINATION**

The ordinance has been coordinated with the City Manager's Office, the Management and Budget Department, the Finance Department, the City Attorney's Office, and the Cultural Arts Board.


## **SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION**

1. The Cultural Arts Board and Staff have discussed and developed funding recommendations for the \$819,000 increase to arts funding. Staff is preparing to present and discuss these recommendations with Council.
2. For the past five months, the Cultural Arts Board and staff have been working to revise the policy and procedures on the Arts Funding Program/Process. Staff will present the final version recommendations to City Council in the next few months for approval. The goal is to have the new policy and procedures in place for the FY 06-07 funding process. We anticipate implementation the first quarter of calendar year 2006.
