SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This ordinance authorizes the City Manager or her designee to execute a Cost Reimbursement Agreement in the amount of \$218,800.00 with San Antonio Fighting Back, primary grantee of the Weed and Seed Initiative. The ordinance will cover overtime costs, confidential informant fees and machinery and equipment associated with public safety activities incurred from April 1, 2005 through March, 31, 2006. The agreement will reimburse overtime costs for public safety activities directed toward the elimination of violent crime, drug trafficking, gang related influences and providing community policing services within the Weed and Seed areas.

Staff recommends the approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Weed and Seed Initiative began in 1991 by the San Antonio Police Department and is one of the ten original sites that continue to provide problem oriented policing within the designated areas. The initiative now exists in over 250 cities across the country. The San Antonio Police Department wrote and administered the original grant from 1991 through 1995 until the grant was transferred in 1996 to San Antonio Fighting Back for the delivery of seeding initiatives. San Antonio Fighting Back is a non-profit agency that provides a variety of social service programs and partners at the grass-roots level to maximize existing resources.

Law enforcement funds were eliminated in 1996 by the Executive Office of Weed and Seed for five years and the San Antonio Police Department recommended that San Antonio Fighting Back apply directly to the federal government to continue "seeding" initiatives. The San Antonio Police Department continued to support Weed and Seed activities after the funding ceased until law enforcement dollars became available in 2002. San Antonio Fighting Back requested that the San Antonio Police Department partner with them to provide public safety activities. The law enforcement funds for 2005-2006 will be used to reimburse the San Antonio Police Department for overtime costs associated with covert operations, directed patrols, community neighborhood restoration projects, the Drug Education for Youth Program and Steering Committee goal setting and strategic planning for both East and West Weed and Seed areas.

POLICY ANALYSIS

The proposed ordinance continues City Council policy of seeking financial assistance from outside sources for law enforcement programs to supplement existing public safety activities. This Cost Reimbursement Agreement will enable the San Antonio Police Department to provide the communities with additional covert activities, community policing initiatives and the enhancement of neighborhood partnerships.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Cost Reimbursement project will be charged for past overtime expenditures by the Police Department and the reimbursable amount will be credited to recover General Fund overtime expenditures. The Department will be reimbursed on a monthly basis by San Antonio Fighting Back beginning in December 2005. The funds are provided through San Antonio Fighting Back by a federal grant through the Community Capacity Development Office. No matching contribution is required. A proposed budget is attached.

COORDINATION

This proposed ordinance has been coordinated with the City Attorney's Office, the Finance Department, and Office of Budget and Management.
