SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This ordinance accepts a proposal, appropriates funds, and authorizes a professional services agreement with Pape-Dawson Engineers, Inc. in the amount of \$137,200 for professional engineering services, authorizes \$13,720 for Project Contingency, and \$10,564.40 for Capital Administrative Costs, for a total ordinance amount of \$161,484.40 in connection with the Broadway Corridor Phase I, Part II Project, an authorized 2005 Storm Water Revenue Bond funded project, located in Council Districts 1 and 2.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This project provides for construction that will upgrade an existing drainage system along a portion of the Broadway Corridor. The subsurface utility engineering services to be provided by Pape-Dawson Engineers, Inc. will provide non-destructive testing and accurate mapping of the existing utilities at three intersections. The subsurface utility engineering services will be performed in support of the Broadway Corridor Storm Water Drainage Improvements project at the following intersections:

- Broadway at Funston Place
- Broadway at Brackenridge Road
- Broadway at Cunningham

The project is currently in the conceptual phase of design and is not scheduled for construction.

This ordinance authorizes compensation in the amount of \$137,200 payable to Pape-Dawson Engineers, Inc. for the completion of the subsurface utility engineering services as outlined in the Professional Services Agreement, included herein as Attachment 2, and authorizes

\$13,720 for project contingency and \$10,564.40 for capital administrative costs. Upon completion of these services, the City will be able to adequately scope the required improvements for the project and negotiate further professional services to design within the finalized scope.

This firm was selected following the City's release of a Request for Qualifications to which thirty (30) firms responded. The Public Works Architectural and Engineering (A/E) Selection Committee met and discussed the statements of qualifications, as well as their evaluations for each of the submitting firms. After careful consideration, the Committee selected Pape-Dawson Engineers, Inc., which was the number two ranked firm. The number one ranked firm, Vickrey & Associates was selected for the Callaghan Road LWC project, which has been estimated at \$5.6 million. Pape-Dawson Engineers, Inc. currently has seven (7) active projects with the City with a total of \$2,796,522 in fees.

POLICY ANALYSIS

Approval of this ordinance will be a continuation of City Council policy to complete previously approved 2005 Storm Water Revenue Bond funded projects.

FISCAL IMPACT

This is a one-time capital improvement expenditure within budget and included in the FY 06-11 Capital Improvement Program Budget. Funds in the amount of \$161,484.40 are available from 2005 Storm Water Revenue Bond funds to be appropriated and payable as follows:


