# **SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS**

An ordinance authorizing the City Manager or her designee to negotiate and execute a professional engineering services agreement with HNTB, Inc. and appropriating funds in an amount not to exceed \$1,400,000.00, authorizing \$98,000.00 for Capital Administrative Costs, and \$1,500.00 for Environmental Services, for a total ordinance amount of \$1,499,500.00, in connection with Design of the Commercial Tributary to 6 Mile Creek, Phase I project, an authorized 2005 Storm Water Revenue Bond funded project located in Districts 3 and 4.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

This project provides for the design and construction of drainage improvements on the Commercial Tributary to 6 Mile Creek, Phase I, which are necessary to bring the drainage structures up to code standards with the 100-year design storm plan. The first phase limits design and construction from the downstream end at 6 Mile Creek upstream through Petaluma.

HNTB will provide complete design for channel reconstruction and drainage improvements for Commercial Tributary to 6 Mile Creek, Phase I. Included in this design is a Phase A design report and jurisdictional determination for the Corps of Engineers 404 permit, which will be evaluated to determine the limits of construction for this project. Upon that determination, HNTB will complete Phase B and Final design for this project. This contract will also provide Bid Phase and Construction Phase engineering services when construction of this project is authorized.

#### **POLICY ANALYSIS**

Approval of this ordinance will be a continuation of City Council policy to complete previously approved 2005 Storm Water Revenue Bond funded projects.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**

This is a one-time capital improvement expenditure within budget and included in the FY 06-11 Capital Improvement Program Budget. Funds in the amount of \$1,499,500.00 are available from 2005 Storm Water Revenue bond funds to be appropriated and payable as follows:

\$ 1,400,000.00 payable for professional engineering services

\$ 98,000.00 for capital administrative costs

\$ 1,500.00 for environmental services

This request has been coordinated with the Office of Budget and Management and the Finance Department.
