Ordinance approving a Consent to Assignment of Lease Agreement for **SUBJECT:**

Ouizno's St. Mary's Street Garage Lease Agreement

DATE: March 30, 2006

SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

An Ordinance consenting to the assignment of the Quizno's lease in the St. Mary's Street Garage located in District 1 and authorizing a form of document that evidences the consent and contains agreements ancillary to the consent.

Staff recommends approval of this Ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In November 2002, the City authorized the execution of a ten-year and 150 day Lease Agreement between the City of San Antonio and JMR Development, Inc., a Texas Corporation, DBA Ouizno's Classic Subs, for the use of approximately 1,742 square feet of retail space and two assigned parking spaces in the St. Mary's Street Parking Garage, located at the intersection of Travis and North St. Mary's Streets. The lease provides tenant with 2 five-year options to renew.

With this action, the leasehold interest of JMR Development, Inc., will be assigned to Too Q'd, L.L.C. as allowed per the Lease.

POLICY ANALYSIS

Approval of this agreement is consistent with the City's policy to consider assignments and other modifications necessary in its Lease Agreements.

FISCAL IMPACT

Per the original lease, JMR Development, Inc. has been paying the City a monthly rent of \$2,613.00 or an annual rate of \$18.00 per square foot, monthly Common Area Maintenance (CAM) charges of \$137.91 or an annual rate of \$0.95 per square foot, and \$125.00 per month per parking space. As such, these same terms and rates will apply to Too Q'd, L.L.C. In addition, the City holds a \$2,750.91 security deposit; however, this assignment will require the assignee to deposit an additional \$2,750.91 to the security deposit. No assignment fee (\$1,000) will be collected per terms of the original Lease.

This item has been coordinated with the City Attorney's Office.
