SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

An Ordinance selecting Bender, Inc., dba Bender Wells Clark Design, a W/MBE, to provide architectural/engineering services in connection with the Main Plaza Redevelopment Project, located in District 1; appropriating funds and authorizing the negotiation and execution of a professional services agreement in an amount not to exceed \$862,000.00; authorizing \$30,000.00 for Project Contingency, \$64,440.00 for Capital Administrative Costs, and \$2,000.00 for Advertising Expenses, for a total amount of \$958,440.00; providing for an immediate effective date; and authorizing the negotiation of an interlocal joint funding agreement with Bexar County.

This ordinance provides for an immediate effective date, upon passage by eight (8) affirmative votes.

Staff recommends approval of this ordinance.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Main Plaza Redevelopment project provides for the development of a master plan and landscape design and construction plans and documents for the redevelopment of the Plaza de las Islas, the historical center of downtown, as a pedestrian plaza. This work will improve drainage, pedestrian accessibility, ADA accessibility for the disabled, and reinforce the historical nature of the plaza.

On December 6, 2005 the City released a Request for Qualification, which was posted on the City's website. Additionally, Public Works staff notified approximately 400 firms, currently on its distribution list, of the release of the RFQ. A Pre-Submission conference was held on December 16, 2005 at the Municipal Plaza Building, which was attended by interested firms and potential subcontractors. On January 4, 2006 the RFQ closed and responses were received from the following three (3) firms:

Bender Inc. dba/Bender Wells Clark Design Beaty & Partners Architects, Inc. The Broussard Group Inc. dba/TBG Partners

The Public Works Architectural and Engineering (A/E) Selection Committee, which included representatives from the Downtown Alliance, the Parks and Recreation Department, the Department of Asset Management and the Public Works Department, convened on January 13, 2006 to review and evaluate the three submittals. After careful consideration, the Committee

selected Bender Inc. dba/Bender Wells Clark Design, which was the firm that received the highest technical points and the most SBEDA points. The Statement of Interest Review Summary is included herein as Attachment 2.

This ordinance authorizes compensation in the amount of \$862,000.00 to Bender Wells Clark Design, for professional engineering basic services, which includes feasibility studies, surveying, design, cost estimates, preparation of plans and bid documents, and bid and construction phase services. These professional services will include, but are not limited to; site master planning and administration through project construction, constructability review, site design of the areas associated with the re-development of Main Plaza, and site drainage improvements for the entire plaza area. Professional services will also include detailed design of all hardscape, traffic and signal revisions, lighting, fountains, irrigation, planting, outdoor structures and furniture elements of the project to include consideration of other pedestrian and traffic-related site design elements beyond the plaza area. This ordinance also authorizes \$30,000.00 for project contingency, \$64,440.00 for capital administrative costs.

Bexar County will fund a portion of the Main Plaza Redevelopment Project. An Interlocal agreement defining the terms of their contribution is being negotiated and will be brought to City Council for consideration within the next 60 days.

The project will be performed on an extremely aggressive schedule that will require a high degree of staff cooperation across the City organizations. A Notice-to-Proceed for design services will be provided to Bender Wells Clark Design the day after approval by City Council in order to assist in facilitating the design completion date of July 2006. Construction on this project is scheduled to begin in September 2006 and to be substantially completed by July 2007. This schedule is dependent upon favorable weather conditions; material availability, utility company responsiveness and positive action on other factors that are beyond city staff's control. An early phase of infrastructure utility, traffic and drainage construction may be developed to commence before the main plaza work, which is necessary to assist in determining the ultimate plan for architectural improvements. This action will ensure that the \$10 million project cap for the redevelopment of the main plaza is not exceeded.

The compressed design schedule and complexity of the project has resulted in a need for accelerated design production and added sub-consultants, such as on-call archaeologist, meeting facilitator and historian. Public Works staff has coordinated with the Department of Contract Services and plans to use the Competitive Sealed Proposal method of bidding to assure the quality and responsiveness of the construction contractor. Public Works staff is also considering separating the construction services into two parts; infrastructure improvements and architectural improvements. Recognizing that this redevelopment could potentially impact other streets in the immediate vicinity, a Phase II project to address the zone of influence is anticipated.

POLICY ANALYSIS

Approval of this ordinance will be a continuation of City Council policy to support the adopted Downtown Master Plan, the Downtown Neighborhood Plan and the Historical Civic Center Master Plan.

FISCAL IMPACT

This is a one-time capital improvement expenditure in the amount of \$958,440.00 and is not included in the FY 06-11 Capital Improvement Program Budget. This ordinance appropriately amends the capital budget and reprograms funds from the Economic Development Incentive Fund and the General Fund to cover the indicated costs as summarized in the following table.

The \$600,000 within the Economic Development Incentive Fund (EDIF) was initially programmed for a public/private sector challenge-match initiative for the Neighborhood Improvement District program. The Neighborhood Action Department has strategically marketed this program for more than two years making over 20 presentations to neighborhood groups and organizations. While there has been modest neighborhood group interest (three applicants initially showed interest in pursing the program with one still remaining to show interest), as of today no neighborhood organization has been able to gather community support for the NID initiative. Looking forward, it is anticipated that the \$600,000 could be reprogrammed for the Main Plaza project.

The Economic Development Incentive Fund (EDIF) showed a projected ending balance of \$335,877 within the FY 2006 Budget. Since the FY 2006 Budget development process, City Council approved funding for two additional initiatives using the EDIF ending balance—additional job training funds for Toyota Suppliers (\$96,160) and a Financial District Study (\$85,000). After actual FY 2005 interest earnings are considered within the EDIF, the fund's ending balance is sufficient to allow \$123,840 to be programmed for the Main Plaza project.

The FY 2006 Adopted General Fund budget included \$559,640 for the November 2005 General Election. However, the City's actual costs for the November 8, 2005 Election was less than originally projected as a result of additional entities participating. Originally, the City and Bexar County were the only jurisdictions scheduled to participate. East Central Independent School District and the Alamo Community College District also participated in the Election and as a result lowered the overall costs per jurisdiction. It is projected that the City's Municipal Elections budget will realize savings in FY 2006 sufficient to reprogram \$234,600 for the Main Plaza project.

Funds for the Main Plaza project are to be reprogrammed and appropriated within the project budget and authorized payable as follows:

COORDINATION




